

**Completing the installation of your  
Ron Nichols Digital Solutions Palette v3.5**

1. Open Adobe Photoshop. If Photoshop was open during your RNDS Palette install, close Photoshop, then reopen.


2. Click the down arrow on your options bar



(See Fig. 1, #1) to expand your tool presets.

3. Click the right arrow on your presets (#2) to expand your tool presets options.

4. Select the tools with a name that matches the title of your palette (#3) from the tool preset list. Click "Append."



5. If the "Current tool only" is checked (#4), deselect this option.

6. To open your RNDS Palette, either double-



click on the desktop/dock icon or go to Start/Programs/Ron Nichols Digital

Solutions/RNDS Palette. (The palette will float on top of all your programs. Just move it around to work, collapse it, or close it all together when you are not using it. Because the palette is an independent program it doesn't open or close with Photoshop. If you open the RNDS Palette before opening Adobe Photoshop, you can just click on the first production action and Photoshop will launch.)

8. Test the installation of your tools by double-clicking "Palette Test/Introduction" key at the top of the Palette. You can then click the movie icon at the top of the palette in order to watch an introduction to the palette.

9. Take some time to watch the videos associated with each key to become familiar with Palette functions.

Note Mac Users: The RNDS files can be found in the **Applications:Ron Nichols Digital Solutions** folder. If you have previously installed the Ron Nichols Digital Learning palette you may want to trash the **Applications:Ron Nichols Digital Learning** folder and the old Dock icon.
